

2007 Wichita State University Annual Security Report

In compliance with the "Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act" formerly known as the "The Student Right to Know and Campus Security Act"

This report does not include privileged counseling or medical information from University Counseling Services or Student Health Services.

Working Together

Wichita State University Main Campus is located in Wichita, Kansas, which has a population of approximately 344,284 and is the largest city in the state. Wichita State has an enrollment of approximately 14,300 students and employs approximately 2,165 faculty and staff. About 950 students live in on-campus housing and in the fraternities and sororities. The West Campus is located in Maize, Kansas. That campus is served by Main Campus faculty and administration, but a separate *Annual Security Report* is available.

Wichita State University is committed to maintaining a safe and secure campus community, which encourages the development of lifelong relationships, and a supportive atmosphere in which all can develop and grow.

A safe and secure community is the shared responsibility of students, faculty and staff and including University police. No community can be totally crime-free in today's society. Crime, drug abuse and alcohol abuse negatively impacts the University community.

Timely Warning

The University Police Department (UPD) and the Wichita Police Department (WPD) attempt to identify crime patterns and crime trends in and near the University community to determine if such crimes pose a safety threat to the University community. In the event a situation arises, on or off campus that constitutes an ongoing or continuing threat to the University community a timely warning will be issued to the University community.

The warnings are posted on the UPD web site, www.wichita.edu/police under **Security Alerts**. **Security Alerts** are sent to the Director of News and Media Relations in the Office of University Relations for email distribution to University faculty and staff members and to the Associate Provost and Chief Information, division of Academic Affairs and Research for email distribution to University students. The **Security Alerts** are also sent to the Editor of the campus newspaper, *The Sunflower*, for publication.

Anyone having information that requires the issue of a timely warning should report the circumstances to UPD by telephone, (316) 978-3450, or in person at the UPD, located on the east side of campus; south of Wilkins Softball Complex and north of the Campus Credit Union.

Policy for Reporting the Annual Disclosure of Crime Statistics

The UPD prepares the *Annual Security Report* to comply with the *Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Act*. The full text of this report is located on the Police Department web site, www.wichita.edu/police under **Annual Security Report**. Statistics are prepared from the UPD record management files. Additional statistics are obtained from the WPD for crimes reported to their department which occurred on properties associated with WSU.

Each person listed as a Campus Security Authority should submit reportable offenses to the police department as they occur throughout the year. The Dean of Students manages the Center for Student Leadership, Child Development Center, Counseling and Testing Center, Heskett Center, Housing and Residence Life (HRL), and Student Health Center. The Dean of Students provides the UPD with statistics regarding crimes reported to University officials. Additionally, the Dean of Students is the University Judicial Officer and reports all disciplinary referrals for violation that occurred on campus to the UPD concerning alcohol, drugs and weapons. HRL has a separate judicial process for disciplinary referrals and reports those statistics to the UPD.

The information in turn is provided for publication in the WSU Schedule of Courses, published each semester and on the University Police web page. Statistical updates on the internet and in publications are available on or before October 1st, and are available for the preceding three (3) years.

Certain hate crimes reported to UPD or the WPD are included in the *Annual Security Report*.

To Report a Crime

In order to contact the UPD, dial 911 (campus phone), or dial 978-3450 (non-campus phone). There are 9 outdoor emergency telephones located around campus for immediate contact with the University Police. The emergency telephones are located on yellow utility poles, topped with blue lights.

Any suspicious activity or persons seen in parking lots or loitering around vehicles, inside buildings or around the Residential Halls should be reported to the police department.

UPD and WPD work together to provide police services to their respective jurisdictions and areas of shared jurisdictions. UPD officers often attend briefings at the nearby WPD Patrol North Station.

Confidential Reporting

UPD strongly encourages victims and witnesses to report crimes to the police. Police reports are public records under state law, and as such, UPD cannot hold police reports in confidence. If victims wish to make a confidential report, they may contact one of the designated reporting persons listed above to keep the matter confidential. The total number of these types of reports is provided to the UPD for disclosure annual crime statistics, but no personal information or incident details are shared with the UPD.

Access Policy

Building Security Residence Halls

Housing and Residence Life Department (HRL) requires that the exterior doors to the residence halls (Fairmount Towers, Brennan Hall, Wheatshocker) remain locked twenty-four hours a day. Security cameras are in place on the outside areas of all HRL property.

UPD Student Cadets augment HRL personnel in providing a security presence at the residence halls during the evening and night time hours. UPD patrol the residence halls and parking lots.

Visitors are not permitted in the residence halls unless they are signed in by the resident they are visiting and are accompanied by that resident.

Residents who tamper with alarms or locks, prop open doors, assist others in gaining unauthorized entry into the residence halls or engage in other actions which interfere with building security or endanger the safety of residents will be referred for disciplinary action.

Fairmount Tower and Brennan Hall residence halls are equipped with fire alarms and smoke detectors. In addition to fire alarms and smoke detectors, Wheatshocker also has sprinkler systems and Stopper II devices installed over the fire alarm pull stations.

Fire safety training is provided to all HRL Community Assistants. Residents are provided information concerning how to respond to a fire alarm in the HRL Handbook.

Residents are not allowed to possess substances capable of producing an open flame, such as candles or incense. Space heaters, halogen lamps, sun lamps, barbecue grills, dishwashers, freezers, extra refrigerators (Wheatshocker Apartments), exterior antennas, and satellite dishes are prohibited in the residence halls.

Smoke detectors and the fire alarm systems are checked monthly. One mandatory fire drill is performed each semester. Water sprinkler systems are checked quarterly and tested annually.

Other University Facilities

The approximately 72 campus buildings are generally open weekdays from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. The campus is patrolled by UPD on a regular basis.

Entry to the Heskett Center, the University's recreation complex, is restricted to students, employees and guests with a valid identification card. WSU ID cards are checked at the entrance desk.

Intercollegiate Athletic Association (ICAA) facilities are restricted to paying customers and students with valid WSU ID's. UPD and ICAA staff controls access during athletic events. During other times, ICAA staff governs access to their facilities. Business offices are open to the public. Team practices may be open at the discretion of the appropriate coaching staff.

University Policy requires that all requests for the employment of law enforcement officers to provide security and/or crowd control for extra or special events held on the Wichita State University campus must be coordinated through the Wichita State University Chief of Police or his designee.

University Police Officers and Student Cadets provide escorts for students and employees on the campus, as requested.

Parking permits are required on campus, except weekends and University recognized holidays. The University campus and parking lots are patrolled on a regular basis by University Police employees in vehicles, on bicycles, or on foot.

The University is subject to all pertinent fire and safety laws and other appropriate ordinances.

Officers report the discovery of unsecured exterior doors and windows in the buildings they patrol. Officers report exterior lights that are not operational and other potentially hazardous conditions on campus. Work orders are generated to address these safety concerns.

University Police Authority and Jurisdiction

UPD has full police authority to apprehend and arrest those involved in illegal acts on-campus and those areas immediately adjacent to campus. If minor offenses involving University rules and regulations are committed by a University student, UPD may also refer the individual to the Dean of Students for disciplinary action.

University Police are authorized under K.S.A. 22-2401a and K.S.A. 76-726. These statutes define the authority and jurisdiction of University Police.

The UPD building is located on the east side of campus; south of Wilkins Softball Complex and north of the Campus Credit Union. Three 15 minute parking stalls are located at the rear of the facility for those utilizing the police department. Access to the parking stalls is gained by driving through the south drive of the Campus Credit Union.

In order to be certified as a law enforcement officer, University Police Officers must successfully complete the 560 hour basic training course offered by the University of Kansas, Department of Continuing Education, Kansas Law Enforcement Training Center. The UPD provides select training courses for University Police personnel. Certified law enforcement officers must achieve a minimum of 40 hours of continuing education each year in order to retain certification.

The UPD maintains close working relationships with the WPD and the Sedgwick County Sheriff's Department, along with other municipal, state and federal agencies in the area. The UPD shares a truncated 800 MHz radio system maintained by Sedgwick County Emergency Communications. With this radio system, the UPD monitor WPD 911 activity in the area of the campus. The UPD has radio interoperability with the WPD, Sedgwick County Sheriff's Department, Emergency Medical Services, Wichita Fire Department, and Sedgwick County Emergency Management.

UPD provides security patrols on campus, residence halls, sororities and fraternities, and the surrounding area in vehicles, on bicycles and on foot. Safety & Security Officers also provide security patrols on campus and at residence halls, in addition to their parking enforcement duties. The UPD is staffed and operational twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. UPD provides jump-starts and vehicle lock-out services, in addition to all normal police services.

Reporting a Crime or Emergency

Students, faculty, staff and visitors to the WSU campus are strongly encouraged to report crimes and public safety concerns to the UPD. In case of an emergency, dial 911 for the UPD. The UPD forwards callers (does not include cell phone users) directly to Sedgwick County Emergency Communications for emergency medical services. UPD also respond to all medical calls and fire calls. UPD contacts Sedgwick County Emergency Communications for fire services.

The telephone equipment at the police department is TTY/TTD capable. Campus telephones are located on the first floor of nearly every campus building and the West Campus for emergency use. Most of the elevators are equipped with a telephone connected directly to the UPD.

Dispatchers are available twenty-four hours a day to answer incoming calls and to dispatch UPD personnel.

UPD Detectives provide follow-up investigations for certain reported crimes. If assistance is required from local, state, or federal law enforcement agencies or local or state fire investigators, UPD will contact the appropriate agency.

The UPD strongly encourages victims of sexual violence to obtain medical services. Via Christi St. Joseph Hospital is the preferred medical choice, as it houses the Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner and Sexual Assault Response Team (SANE/SART) and utilizes victim's advocates from the Wichita Area Sexual Assault Center (WASAC). Victims of sexual violence are encouraged to provide clothing worn during and after sexual violence to authorities at the medical center or to law enforcement. Valuable evidence may be obtained for the prosecution of sexual violence. Victims of sexual violence are encouraged not to bathe, douche, or change clothing prior to medical treatment for the same rationale.

Counselors

Campus Pastoral Counselors and Professional counselors, when acting as such are not considered to be a campus security authority and are not required to report crimes for inclusion into the annual disclosure of crime statistics. As a matter of policy they are encouraged, if and when deemed appropriate, to inform persons being counseled of the procedures to report crimes on a voluntary basis.

Security Awareness Programs

During orientation programs, information is provided to academic advisors about the UPD and the services it provides. Crime reduction and prevention programs and sexual violence programs are offered on an on-going basis.

Periodically during the academic year, UPD, in cooperation with other university organizations and departments, presents crime reduction and crime awareness sessions on such topics as sexual violence, theft, alcohol and drug abuse, as well as educational sessions on personal safety and residence hall security.

A common theme of all awareness and crime reduction programs is to encourage students, faculty and staff to be aware of their surroundings and to call UPD to report suspicious behavior. This allows UPD to investigate and effectively partner with the community members to reduce crime and disorder within our community.

In addition to community presentations, safety information is disseminated through brochures, University intranet articles, and articles and advertisements in university publications and student newspaper.

Urgent information is transmitted to the university community through posting **Security Alerts** on the police web site www.wichita.edu/police and by sending the **Security Alerts** to the Director of News and Media Relations in the Office of University Relations for email distribution to University faculty and staff members and to the Associate Provost and Chief

Information Officer, division of Academic Affairs and Research for email distribution to faculty/staff and students.

Crime Prevention

The Community Services Section coordinates crime reduction and prevention programs provided by the UPD. Safety programming encourages members of the community to be active observers and reporters of crime and to take recommended steps to reduce opportunities for offenders to commit crimes. Crime prevention programs may be provided in nearly any campus venue by UPD, and different faculty and staff of the University.

UPD is engaged in partnerships with the Wichita Area Sexual Assault Center and YWCA Community Outreach Program to provide sexual violence and intimate violence educational materials, services, and programming to the campus community.

Fraternalities and sororities may conduct periodic awareness and safety training during their chapter meetings. HRL may coordinate or provide similar safety programs.

General crime reduction and prevention information is available at the UPD web site, www.wichita.edu/police. Crime information and statistics are provided to the student newspaper and printed in each semester's Schedule of Courses and at the UPD web site. The Director of News and Media Relations in the Office of University Relations emails crime reduction and safety information to the campus community. Studio B, the student produced weekly television program, produces stories and programs concerning safety issues. Personal safety tips are published in the Orientation Guidebook distributed to all new students. Information concerning services provided by the UPD is outlined in the WSU Student Handbook distributed during orientation.

Monitoring Off-Campus Activity

When a WSU student is involved in an off-campus crime, the UPD may be asked to assist in the investigation with the appropriate local, state, or federal law enforcement officials. The UPD and WPD have shared jurisdiction for fraternity and sorority properties adjacent to campus.

Many graduate and undergraduate students live in the neighborhoods surrounding WSU. While the WPD has jurisdiction in those areas off campus, UPD may respond to and work with the WPD during the initial police response and follow-up investigations of student-related incidents that occur in close proximity to campus. UPD has direct radio communications with the WPD, WFD, and EMS services to facilitate rapid response to any emergency situation.

Alcohol

Wichita State University's Policy and Procedure on Cereal Malt Beverage and Alcoholic Liquor can be viewed on line at http://webs.wichita.edu/inaudit/ch11_07.htm

Kansas state law prohibits those under the age of 21 from possession or consumption of cereal malt beverage or alcoholic liquors.

Generally, cereal malt beverage and alcoholic liquors are prohibited on campus, except under circumstances provided by University Policy. The same policy defines where, when, and how the sale or possession of cereal malt beverages or alcohol may occur on campus. Cereal Malt Beverages may not be consumed in educational buildings.

It is illegal to drive or attempt to operate a motor vehicle while having a blood alcohol or breath concentration (BAC) of .08 or above. On January 1, 1997 the Kansas Legislature passed a "Zero Tolerance" law. This law states that operating or attempting to operate a motor vehicle under the age of 21 with a BAC of .02 or higher will result in a driver's license suspension of one year.

Substance Abuse Prevention Program

The Division of Campus Life and University Relations provides annual educational programming and support services for students in the area of alcohol and other drug awareness. The Counseling and Testing Center presents classes throughout the year to any organization requesting alcohol awareness training. General and specific drug and alcohol awareness training is presented when requested by ICAA coaches for their players/students. One-on-one counseling sessions are available to any student or employee as requested. Student Health Services provides drug and alcohol awareness both on a group and individual basis. The professional staff offers various presentations to groups as requested. Health educational pamphlets about drug and alcohol abuse are distributed when indicated to those individuals seeking care at Student Health Services. Individual counseling and offering campus and community resources as needed are provided through Student Health Services. Student groups such as the Student Activities Council also provide drug and alcohol abuse programming.

Different campus entities, including the Counseling and Testing Center and Student Health Services, coordinate programs during National Collegiate Alcohol Awareness Week. These activities may include a proclamation signing by the University President, films, information tables, programs presented to Housing and Greek groups, and serving non-alcoholic beverages (NABS).

Educational mediums include the use of bulletin boards, newsletters, and electronic resources. Student Health Services distributes pamphlets through campus mail and in boxes across campus. The residence halls and Greek Community plan a variety of educational programs targeting alcohol and drug use and abuse.

The following Substance Abuse Prevention Program began in August 21, 1990, and was adopted pursuant to the requirements of the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988 and the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989:

Wichita State University prohibits the unlawful possession, use, manufacture, or distribution of alcohol or controlled substances by students and employees in buildings, facilities, grounds, or property controlled by the University, or as part of University activities. Students and employees

commit the University to a program to prevent the abuse of alcohol and the illegal use of controlled substances and/or alcohol. Students and employees are subject to disciplinary action in accordance with state law and University policy if found to be using, possessing, manufacturing or distributing controlled substances, or abusing alcohol. Discipline may include, but is not limited to: expulsion, termination of employment, referral for prosecution, and/or the completion, at the individual's expense, of an appropriate substance abuse assistance or rehabilitation programs.

As a condition of employment, all employees of Wichita State University, including student employees, shall abide by the terms of this policy statement. Students and employees are required to report any criminal drug statute conviction occurring in buildings, facilities, grounds, or property controlled by the University, no later than five (5) days after such conviction. Wichita State University, in turn, will notify as appropriate the applicable federal agency of the conviction within ten (10) days of its receipt of notification of the conviction. For purposes of this policy, "conviction" means a finding of guilt (including the plea of nolo contendere) or imposition of sentence, or both, by a municipal, state or federal court.

The term "controlled substances" as used in this policy means those substances included in Schedules I through V of Section 202 of the Controlled Substance Act and are further defined by regulations 21CFR 1300.11 through 1300.15. The term does not include the use of a controlled substance pursuant to a valid prescription or other uses authorized by law. A list of controlled substances is maintained in the Offices of Human Resources, The Division of Campus Life and University Relations, Academic Affairs and Research, Ablah Library, the WSU Police Department, Student Government Association, and Student Health Services.

Local, state, and federal laws provide for a variety of legal sanctions and penalties for the unlawful possession or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol. These sanctions include, but are not limited to, incarceration and monetary fines.

Drug Types and Effects

Drug Type Name, Immediate Effects and Complications

Stimulants

Amphetamines: Benzedrine, Dexedrine, Methedrine, diet pills, and Ecstasy. Effects include euphoria, and increased alertness. Complications include nervousness, paranoia, hallucinations, dizziness, tremors, decreased mental ability, sexual impotence, insomnia, skin disorders, malnutrition, delusions, psychosis, seizures, and death.

Cocaine: Coke, Crack. Effects include brief euphoria, increased energy, and intense exhilaration. Complications include tremors, nasal bleeding and inflammation, toxic psychosis, seizures, damage to nasal septum and blood vessels, and death from overdose.

Nicotine: Cigarettes, cigars, pipes, snuff, chewing tobacco. Effects include relaxation, increased confidence, and increased metabolism. Complications include high blood pressure, emphysema, bronchitis, heart and lung disease, cancer, and death.

Caffeine: Coffee, cola, No-Doz, tea. Effects include increased mental alertness, increased blood pressure and respiration. Complications include nervousness, insomnia, dehydration, stomach irritation, and fatigue.

Depressants

Alcohol: Beer, wine, liquor, some medications. Effects include muscle relaxation, intoxication, depression, impaired motor control, impaired memory and judgment. Complications include dehydration and hangover. Overdose or mixing with other depressants can cause respiratory failure, obesity, impotence, psychosis, ulcers, malnutrition, liver and brain damage, delirium tremens (DTs), and death.

Tranquilizers: Valium, Librium, Equanil, Miltown, Thorazine. Effects include relief of tension and anxiety, and drowsiness. Complications include hangover, menstrual irregularities, increases or decreases effect of other drugs, especially dangerous with alcohol; destroys blood cells, jaundice, coma, and death.

Barbiturates: Nembutal, Amythal, Seconal, Phenobarbital. Effects include euphoria, relief of anxiety, loss of inhibition, muscle relaxation, loss of motor control, drowsiness; especially dangerous with alcohol. Complications include lethargy, hangover, blurred vision, nausea, depression, seizures, excessive sleepiness, confusion, irritability, and severe withdrawal sickness; can be fatal if mixed with alcohol or other depressants.

Narcotics: Heroin, morphine, opium, codeine, methadone, Demerol. Effects include euphoria, drowsiness, and painkillers. Complications include respiratory and circulatory depression, dizziness, vomiting, sweating, dry mouth, lowered libido, lethargy, constipation, weight loss, temporary sterility and impotence, withdrawal sickness, stupor, and death.

Inhalants: Amyl nitrate butyl nitrate, nitrous oxide, glue and paint. Effects include lowered blood pressure, relaxation of sphincter muscles, and feeling of heightened sexual arousal. Complications include headache, dizziness, accelerated heart rate, nausea, nasal irritation, cough, lost erections, hallucinations; liver, kidney, bone marrow and brain damage, and death.

Hallucinogen Psychedelics

Cannabis: Marijuana, hashish, THC. Effects include relaxation, altered sense of hearing, time, vision; euphoria. Complications include increased heart rate and appetite; dilated pupils, memory impairment, impaired driving ability, possible lung damage, and reduced sperm count and sperm mobility; damage from impure dose.

LSD, psilocybin, MDA, peyote, DMT, STP: Effects include hallucinations, altered sense of time, space and visual perception. Effects include nausea, disorientation, panic, depression,

paranoia, physical exhaustion after use, psychosis, exaggerated body distortion; fears of death, flashback, adverse drug reactions, and psychosis.

Weapons

It is the policy of the Kansas Board of Regents that, to the extent permitted by law, the campus of each state university shall be weapon-free. See University Policy 11.19

Weapons, explosives and other hazardous objects or substances shall include, but not limited to, the following:

- Any object or device which will, is designed to, or may be readily converted to expel bullet, shot or shell by action of an explosive or other propellant;
- Any handgun, pistol, revolver, rifle, shotgun or other firearm of any nature, including concealed weapons licensed pursuant to the Personal and Family Protection Act, and amendments thereto;
- Any BB gun, pellet gun, air/CO2 gun, stun gun or blow gun;
- Any explosive, incendiary or poison gas (A) bomb, (B) mine, (C) grenade, (D) rocket having propellant charge of more than four ounces, or (E) missile having an explosive or incendiary charge of more than ¼ ounce;
- Any incendiary or explosive material, liquid, solid or mixture equipped with a fuse, wick or other detonating device;
- Any tear gas bomb or smoke bomb; however personal self-defense items containing mace or pepper spray shall not be deemed to be a weapon for the purposes of this policy;
- Any knife, commonly referred to as a switch-blade, which has a blade that opens automatically by hand pressure applied to a button, spring or other device in the handle of the knife, or any knife having a blade that opens or falls or is ejected into position by the force of gravity or by an outward, downward or centrifugal thrust or movement;
- Any straight-blade knife of four inches or more such as a dagger, dirk, dangerous knife or stiletto; except that an ordinary pocket knife or culinary knife designed for and used solely in the preparation or service of food shall not be construed to be a weapon for the purposes of this policy;
- Any martial arts weapon such as nunchucks and throwing stars;
- Any longbow, crossbow and arrows or other projectile that could cause serious harm to any person;
- All fireworks
- Any operative animal trap or device that is used to ensnare animals (with the exception of mist nets used to snare birds or devices use by Physical Plant personnel or the University Police Department to control wild animals on campus).

For purposes of the above, weapons would not include items or materials used in or necessary for the conduct of Board-approved academic programs or University-approved activities or practices. The University's Chief of Police should be notified about any such items or materials in advance of their use or presence on campus and mandate specific requirements for the possession, use and storage of such items or materials.

Weapons, as defined above, are not permitted on University property unless in the possession of a law enforcement officer, armored car security personnel, or as otherwise specifically permitted and authorized by the Personal and Family Protection Act, as amended.

The President and CEO of the Board of Regents will be notified, in writing by the University's Vice President and General Counsel, of any activities or practices involving weapons that are approved by the University.

University faculty and staff are prohibited from carrying a concealed weapon while on the premises of the University or while engaged in the duties of the faculty or staff member's employment with the University.

It is a misdemeanor to carry a concealed weapon on University property or in any University facility where prohibited by the Personal and Family Protection Act, as amended.

This policy is intended to apply and cover buildings and land owned by the WSU Board of Trustees.

Students should also see the [Student Code of Conduct](#), section 8.05 and employees, [Carrying Concealed Weapons](#) by Employees, section 3.26 of the Policies and Procedures Manual.

Sexual Assault

Sexual violence, including stranger or non-stranger sexual assault; sexual abuse; or other forms of forced or non-forced sexual violence are prohibited. The sexual assault of one member of the University community by another will not be tolerated. This policy applies to all members of the University community: students, staff, and faculty.

Kansas statutes define sexual violence. The statutes include crimes such as rape, (stranger or non-stranger), sexual battery, incest, and aggravated indecent liberties with a child.

If sexual violence occurs on campus, the crime victim is strongly encouraged to report the crime to the UPD. If the person is sexually assaulted or violated outside the UPD jurisdiction, the crime victim is strongly encouraged to report the crime to the appropriate law enforcement agency. The crime victim can report the incident to Campus Life and University Relations, if the crime victim does not wish to report the offense to the police or if assistance is requested in notifying law enforcement authorities.

The UPD strongly encourages victims of sexual violence to obtain medical services. Via Christi St. Joseph Hospital is the preferred medical choice, as it houses the Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner and Sexual Assault Response Team (SANE/SART) and utilizes victim's advocates from the Wichita Area Sexual Assault Center (WASAC). Victims of sexual violence are encouraged to provide clothing worn during and after sexual violence to authorities at the medical center or to law enforcement. Valuable evidence may be obtained for the prosecution of sexual violence. Victims of sexual violence are encouraged not to bathe, douche, or change clothing prior to medical treatment for the same rationale.

Services are available on campus to assist victims of sexual violence on an immediate and ongoing basis. Medical services may also be accessed at the Student Health Service or other local hospitals. Counseling support is available on campus through the Counseling and Testing Center, Multicultural Affairs and the Wichita Area Sexual Assault Center.

Students who wish to seek a change in housing arrangements are encouraged to contact HRL staff. Changes will be accommodated as reasonably available. Academic assistance is provided through the dean's office of the student's academic college. Other assistance is available through Campus Life and University Relations.

Sexual Harassment

In addition to being illegal, sexual harassment runs counter to the objectives of this University. When people, whether student, faculty, unclassified professional, or classified staff, feel coerced, threatened, intimidated, or otherwise pressured by others into granting sexual favors, their academic and work performance is likely to suffer. In addition, such actions violate not only the dignity of the individual but also the integrity of the University as a learning institution. Academic freedom flourishes when all are free to pursue ideas in a non-threatening, non-coercive atmosphere of mutual respect. Sexual harassment is harmful not only to persons involved but also the entire University community.

Wichita State University reaffirms its commitment to maintaining an environment free of intimidation, fear, reprisal, and coercion - one in which student, faculty, unclassified professionals and classified staff can develop intellectually, personally, and socially.

All members of the University community are responsible for promoting a positive working and learning environment where all persons are free to discuss any problems or questions they may have concerning sexual harassment at the University, without fear of intimidation or retaliation.

Student Disciplinary Procedures

Campus disciplinary hearings serve to educate and protect members of the University community. Hearings are held independently of any actions taken by criminal and civil courts, and the concept of double jeopardy does not apply to these circumstances.

Procedural protections are afforded to both the victim and the accused in cases of an alleged sex offense. These procedures may also be used for violations of other University policies.

A letter will be sent to the accused student which includes the following information:

- The nature of the alleged offense;
- The approximate date and time of the alleged offense;

- A citation of the University regulation which applies to the case;
- Information about the nature of the hearing;
- Adequate notice to prepare for a hearing with a deadline for meeting with the appropriate hearing officer.

The initial hearing includes the following safeguards:

- Accused students will be allowed to hear a summary of the evidence against him or her from the hearing officer;
- Accused students will be allowed to bring an advisor who may be an attorney to the hearing;
- Accused students will be allowed to question witnesses;
- Accused students will be allowed to present witnesses and other information pertinent to the case;
- Accused students will be allowed to make a recording of the hearing at his or her expense;
- The decision of the hearing officer will be provided to the accused student and victim.

The results of the hearing may be appealed in accordance with procedures for filing a case with the Vice President for Campus Life and University Relations or the WSU Supreme Court. Procedures for filing an appeal are outlined in the WSU Student Handbook.

Victims have several rights in the discipline process, including the following:

- The victim may bring an advisor to any hearing or conference related to the alleged incident;
- The decision of the hearing officer will be provided to the victim in writing;
- All discipline hearings are closed and confidential proceedings of the University;
- A pre-conference hearing may be held to discuss procedures for the hearing and answer any questions that the participants may have.

Registered Offenders

In accordance to the *Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act of 2000*, which amends the *Jacob Westerling Crimes against Children and Sexually Violent Offender Registration Act of 1974*, The UPD provides a link to the Kansas Bureau of Investigation's (KBI) Registered Offender Registry. This act requires institutions of higher education to issue a statement advising the campus community where law enforcement information provided by a State concerning registered sex offenders may be obtained.

The statute requires sex offenders already required to register in a State to provide notice of each institution of higher education in that State at which the person is employed, carries a vocation, or is a student. Those wishing to know if someone is a registered offender may obtain that

information through the Kansas Bureau of Investigation's web site: <http://www.accesskansas.org/kbi/ro.shtml>. A list of those Registered Offenders attending classes or employed by the University can be viewed at the University Police Department.

Crisis/Emergency Management

Wichita State University has had a crisis management plan in place since 1999. See University Policy 20.02 http://webs.wichita.edu/inaudit/ch20_02.htm

The University has recently taken steps, in coordination with the Kansas Board of Regents, to revise and update WSU's plan to provide a comprehensive blueprint and foundation for our crisis management planning and preparedness efforts. The plan is accessible at www.wichita.edu/emergency

The University has also taken deliberate steps to enhance and improve the ability to communicate with WSU faculty, staff, students and guests. Students and their parents have recently been advised of the following steps taken:

- Using existing capabilities to provide information advisories through "e-mail blasts"
- Offering text messaging services to those who register their cellular phones
- Installing a digital communication system in all university buildings

Another important facet of WSU's crisis management plan is the ongoing development of a Web page devoted to emergency and crisis management. This page can serve as a vital and important resource for the WSU community before, during and after a crisis situation.

The safety and well-being of the campus community is crucially important. That's why WSU is engaged in a multi-disciplinary and multi-faceted effort to engage, plan, prepare and equip the university and its leadership team with the resources necessary to respond to a crisis, whether a natural disaster or man-made. Crisis preparedness is an ongoing responsibility and is of the highest priority for WSU. The University will continue to plan, prepare and work with its constituencies on a continuing basis.

Availability of the Annual Security Report

Wichita State University's *Annual Security Report* contains certain crime statistics for the previous three years.
