## *Conference Honorees*

### **The Quincy Wright Distinguished Scholar Award**

The Quincy Wright Distinguished Scholar Award is given annually to a scholar who has significantly influenced international studies scholarship in the ISA-Midwest region. The Quincy Wright Distinguished Scholar honors a professor with an exceptional record of scholarship in international studies, a distinguished record of service to the International Studies Association and/or other international affairs organizations, and a record of service within the region.

**James M. McCormick** is Professor and Chair of the Department of Political Science at Iowa State University. He received his BA from Aquinas College (Grand Rapids, MI) in 1968, his MA from Michigan State University in 1969, and his Ph.D. from Michigan State University in 1973. He is a former American Political Science Association Congressional Fellow (1986-1987), who worked in the office of Congressman Lee Hamilton of Indiana. McCormick has authored or edited ten books, including the fifth edition of *American Foreign Policy and Process* (Cengage/Wadsworth, 2009) and the fifth edition of *The Domestic Sources of American Foreign Policy: Insights and Evidence*, co-edited with Eugene R. Wittkopf (Rowman & Littlefield, 2008). In addition, he has published more than sixty book chapters and articles in such journals as *World Politics*, the *American Political Science Review*, *American Journal of Political Science*, *The Journal of Politics*, *International Studies Quarterly*, and *Legislative Studies Quarterly*. He was a recipient of the Iowa State University Foundation Award for Outstanding Research at Mid-Career in 1990, a Fulbright Senior Scholar Award to New Zealand in 1993, the Fulbright-SyCip Distinguished Lecturer Award to the Philippines in 2003, the Iowa State University College of Liberal Arts and Sciences Award for Outstanding Achievement in Departmental Leadership in 2004, and the 2010 Iowa State University Foundation International Service Award. He has been co-editor of *International Studies Quarterly* (1999-2003), was a member of the *International Studies Association* (ISA) Nominating Committee (for President, Vice-president, Secretary, and Treasurer) in 2001, served as vice-president of the *ISA* Foreign Policy Analysis Section in 2008-2009, and is currently on the editorial board of *Foreign Policy Analysis*.

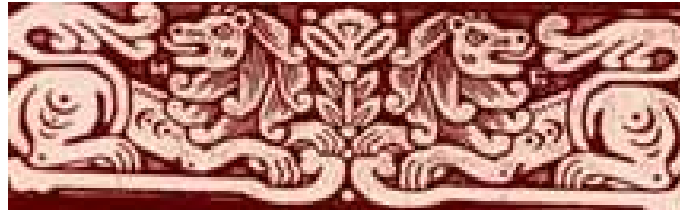

## CENTRAL SLAVIC CONFERENCE

### **In Memoriam of Professor Charles Timberlake**

Just like last year, the Central Slavic Conference is hosting the Charles Timberlake Memorial Symposium, honoring an outstanding scholar of Russia and the Soviet Union.

Dr. Charles Timberlake was professor of history specializing in modern Russia/Soviet Union at the University of Missouri-Columbia (MU) from 1967 to 2004. He also served as chair of the MU history department for four years. He authored a history of Russian Orthodox monasteries and convents since 1917, co-authored a study on the quality of life in Russian rural villages in the former Soviet Union, edited a book of essays on Russian liberalism, and edited a book on religious and secular forces in late Tsarist Russia. He was the author of more than 40 book chapters and journal articles on socio-economic development in European Russia.

Professor Timberlake lectured abroad at universities in England, Finland, Russia, Georgia, and the People's Republic of China (where he was an honorary professor of history at Lanzhou University in 1991). Professor Timberlake was loved by his students (both undergraduate and graduate) at "Mizzou." His undergraduate course on Stalinist Russia was a popular staple for years. In 1996, he won the MU Byler Distinguished Professor award. In 2000, he won the University of Missouri Alumni Association's Distinguished Faculty Award. And in 2002, he won the MU Provost's Award for Leadership in International Education. In 2002, he won Berea College's Distinguished Alumnus Award.

Professor Timberlake received his BA from Berea College in 1957, an MA from Claremont Graduate School in 1962, and a PhD from the University of Washington in 1968 (where he studied with Donald Treadgold, a well-known 20th Century Russian history specialist). Professor Timberlake was instrumental in helping further the development of the Central Slavic Conference from its early years in the 1960s, when it was the Bi-State Slavic Conference. He went on to serve as its president on more than one occasion.
